Besançon Trip a Success!!

Joan Jacquay Monnier has had a dream, a lifetime dream. She has dreamed of visiting the churches, small villages, cemeteries and meeting the people of her heritage. This summer Joan, her daughter, Sandy Monnier, and five other members of the Besançon Historical Society spent almost two weeks visiting the "French Jura" region of Switzerland and the French Comté region. Under the direction of Gene Yoquelet the trip was success. The group included: Joan Johnson, Michael and Martha Gladieux, Evelyn Geiger, Joan and Sandy Monnier and Gene Yoquelet.

The ties between Besançon, USA and Besançon, France were strengthened when the group meet and were hosted by Georges Jeanney and a selected group from the Montjoye Association of Saint Louis Church in Besançon, France. Mr. Jeanney is the CEO of DIMECO from Besançon, France and while on business in Chicago in 1997 he heard of a little town in Indiana with the same name. He rented a car and drove across the state to see for himself if the place existed. He was welcomed by Agnes Hart, the principal of the Saint Louis Academy, and enjoyed visiting classes and meeting the children. Many of them were 6th and 7th generation with Franc-Comtois names. A correspondence grew and when members of the Besançon Historical Society expressed interest in a trip Mr. Jeanney was gracious to offer much hospitality.

The River Doubs forms a loop around Besançon and it is surmounted by a famous citadel on one of the seven hills that encircle the city. It was recently named the "greenest city in France" and has many gardens and parks the group enjoyed. The tour began with a reception given in their honor by the Lieutenant Mayor of the city at City Hall.

And, yes, a bond was formed between the two associations.

GEANT - GIANT HISTORY and GENEALOGY

In this issue we continue with the families of the Besançon area of Jefferson Township, Allen County. research. Contributing to this article: Joan Jacquay Monnier and Eugene Yoquelet.

Generation No. 1

1. JEAN PIERRE GEANT was born in Rougemont; Dept. Haute Rhin, France. He married ANASTASIA SALLIER. She was born in Rougemont; Dept. Haute Rhin, France.

French emigration records dated 24 February 1840 list the members of eight families who applied for passports to emigrate from France to America. All eight families were from the town of Rougemont, Department of Haut Rhin, France. The men whose names were given in the records were all born in Rougemont and were farmers. (Register #7, lines 1351 - 1358) NOTE: Presently Rougemont is known as Rougemont Le Château and is located in the Department of the Territoire de Belfort.

Line #1352 Jean Pierre PETITJEAN, age 30, with wife and three children

Line #1353 Pierre LAMBELIN, age 42, with wife and six children

Line #1355 Jean Pierre GEANT, age 35, with wife and three children

Line #1356 Pierre MOULIN, age 24, with wife and (one or two) children

Line #1357 George BLANC, age 47, with wife and four children

Line #1358 Jean Claude DUPONT, age 29, with wife and one child

Their stated destination was Philadelphia. However, three of the eight families: the two Dupont families and the Geant family arrived at the Port of New York on 9 June 1840 on the ship Robert Parker. The Ship Master was **William L. Dwight** who signed his name to the ship's manifest which included 195 passengers from Bavaria, Hesse, Wurtemberg, Suisse (Switzerland) and France.

The Dupont and Geant families are listed together on the manifest as follows: Laio (or Saio) Dupont 28, Jean 30, Marg 30, Jean 60, Marie 25, Jean Geant 30, Jean 11, Marie 9, Marg 25, Louise 2, Marg 2.

Jacques Giant arrived in America, May 25, 1840 in New York and citizenship declared, on July 1, 1853 in Allen County, Indiana. He is first listed in the 1860 census of Jefferson Township, Allen County, page 618, #1265 line 37. He is recorded in the 1868 "Register" of St. Louis Catholic Church, Besançon.

Carlton retired from the Allen County Schools after 45 years and Charlotte is a homemaker.





Saint Madeleine Church (above) Courchaton, France.

A number of emigrants left this parish of Saint Madeleine to settle in Stark County, Ohio and later in Allen County, Indiana. The names found in the Rev. Charles Banet book: "Courchaton, Dept of La Haute Saone", 1670 - 1852 were translated, indexed, and edited in 1980. They include baptismal, marriage, and death registers for the Catholic parish of St. Madeleine and the civil Registers at Courchaton. Some of names for St. Madeleine were: Chevillot, Girardot, Gremaux, Huguenard, Isabey, Sordelet.

To the left is the Saint Privat Church in Arsey, France. At one time you would find the names of Banet, Martin, Rondat and Perrey in the parish records.

FORT WAYNE and ALLEN COUNTY Directory for 1869 - 1870 (Fort Wayne: A.B. Cook, Jr., compiled and published, 1869)

The following was abstracted from the above directory by **Terri Gorney**, **CGRS**. All of those listed below lived in Jefferson Township and had a connection to the community of Besançon or Saint Louis Besançon Church. This directory listed: surnames, first names, occupation, whether they owned or rented their land, post office, the road on which they lived, and the distance from Fort Wayne.

Jefferson Township lies in eastern Allen County, Indiana. It is bounded by Milan to the north, Jackson to the east, Madison to the south, and Adams to the west. The surface is generally level, with a few good ridges of excellent land. It is well timbered in the eastern part of the township. The streams are abundant in fish, and there are traces of beaver in many of the creeks. The Maumee River flows through the north western part of the township. The Wabash and Erie canal, and Toledo, Wabash, and Western Railroad pass through the northern and the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne, and Chicago Railway through the south eastern corner of the township. The township contains one Catholic Church (St. Louis Besançon) comprising of 103 families. The population of the township is rated as follows: 615 males; 512 females; total 1,127.


