# Society Acquires Family Papers A treasure of historical significance

In February, 2001, the Besançon Historical Society was privilege and honored to receive the original "GREMAUX DOCUMENTS' from the Walter and Mary Gremaux family, of Monroeville, Indiana. Their trust in the society for the care and preservation of these valuable papers is indeed greatly appreciated, and make a wonderful addition to our archives. They are a treasure with historical significance to our French history.

The documents include the following: original pass port for FRANCOIS XAVIER GRE-MAUX, original pass port for PIERRE JOSEPH HUGUENARD, Communion Record for ARSENE GREMAUX, and the naturalization record for ARSENE GREMAUX. Included with these four documents is a "medical booklet" published in French, and no doubt brought along with the Gremauxs on their emigration to America.

These documents were taken to responsible and acknowledgeable people at a frame shop in Fort Wayne. The documents are now placed on a acid free paper and under a special protective glass and are framed. They are hung in one of the archive rooms for all to read and enjoy. They, indeed, represent a part of our French heritage in East Allen County.

Other valuable collections in the archives are two large portraits of FRANCOIS AND MARY (LOMONT) GLADIEUX, a large portrait of ETIENNE COULARDOT, an interior picture of the original look and design of SAINT LOUIS CHURCH, two large photographs of the 50th wedding anniversaries' (1910) of GLADIEUX/LOMONT and TOWNSEND/GLADIEUX, a large portrait of GEORGE AND JOSEPHINE (GLADIEUX) TOWNSEND, and a portrait of LEWIS BEUCHAT. One photograph that is most unique is that of the "FRENCH/AMERICAN SOCIETY featuring almost all of the French names found in Allen County at the turn of the century. Included are those of the parish communities of Saint Vincent, Saint Louis and Saint Rose.

## President's Message

A large number of our members live outside the Allen County area, but still subscribe to the newsletter. This is their only source of information and contact with the society. The ones in this group should be more enlighten as to the actual functions of our society.

The Besançon Historical Society was founded in 1994 and incorporated in 1995 as a 'not for profit' organization. The main purpose of the society is to collect and preserve the histories/genealogies of the early settlers of east Allen County, particularly those of French descent. And, to make these materials available to its membership and the public. To **establish** and **maintain** a permanent archival library, and to have the archives open to the public and its members. There are other purposes, but what I mention above is the most important one.

The structure of the society states that its members have the sole right to govern and control all its activities through the officers elected at the annual corporation meeting. The society shall have a Board of Directors as its ultimate governing body to insure its effective functioning and management. The Board of Directors have certain responsibilities which I will not list all of them, but one in particular relates to the fiscal health and stability of the society; one is to approve the budget projected and the proposed use before presented to the annual meeting.

What makes our society so unusual and unique from other societies such as ours, we have elected to maintain archives for our materials and use. We now have a photo gallery archive, a library for research, a library for genealogies and a office/computer room. The archives were created by a few people through their hard work, dedication and money made the archives what it is today, and we thank those who have made extra donations towards this cause especially the archive library fund. The archives is something we cannot

The cost of renting space for the archives will be increased, postage is costing more, we have a computer that needs updating or replaced. Our treasurer have managed well on the income from past dues, and we have set aside enough money to be used for the publishing of two books. We have not raised membership dues from 1994 to the present. Now, at this annual meeting, the Board of Directors must present to the members of the annual voting meeting a budget for 2002. We have now come to a 'fork in the road'. With the increases mentioned above, we cannot continue to operate on previous budgets.

Presently, we have about 52 active paying members and 16 lifetime members who paid one total sum. This gives you a idea what we generate in dues. As your president, I am asking all our members and to give you a vote in this discussing by writing, calling or Emailing our editor, Joyce Crowl (jjcrowl@c3net.net). Every paying member has a vote in the decision making of the society whether you can or cannot attend the monthly meetings. Your comments will be sent to myself or the Board of Directors. We need your input!

## Weekly Breeze, Thursday, October 3, 1901 Monroeville Newspaper

Mrs. Louis Beaushot (Beuchat) - At the country residence tow and one-half miles northwest of Monroeville in Monroe Twp. on Friday evening, September 27, 1901 occurred the death of Mrs. Louis Beaushot after suffering for only a few weeks from typhoid fever. She leaves a husband and five children who are all down at the present time with the same terrible disease and while all have been in critical condition for several weeks past, they are at the present time improving and considered to be out of danger. Two months ago a son preceded the mother to that better world from Funeral was held from the the same disease. house last Monday morning and at 10:30 services were conducted at St. Rose Catholic Church by pastor Rev L R Paquet with burial in the Catholic cemetery. Note: Mrs. Louis Beuchat was the former Caroline Dodane, b. June 5, 1864 in Jefferson Twp, the daughter of Joseph and Caroline (Pequignot) Dodane, early French settlers in Allen county. e.e. yoquelet.

## Weekly Breeze, January 30, 1890

Peter Gladieux, an old and prominent citizen of Jefferson Twp., recently died at his homestead. He was the father of Representative, F. Gladieux, Mr. C. Gladieux, Mrs. Geo Townsend, and Mrs. Alfonse Lomont.

January 18, 1890, 78y 8d with burial in St. Louis Cemetery, Besançon. His father: **Phillipus Gladieux**, died in 1865 at the age 76y, and is recorded in the cemetery records as the oldest burial in the cemetery, Besançon. e.e. yoquelet


### Zulu News October 3, 1912

In the 1870's, as it is today, the land was cheaper in Paulding County, Ohio and many of the French settlers moved 'east'. Below is two of the families mentioned in the above publication.

Frank Alexander Pio (page 62) is a native of New York, having been born in Oswego County, January 7, 1846, the son of J. B. and Mary (Rusay) Pio, of French extraction. The parents came from France in 1828, and located in New York, where they remained for several years. They then went to Allen County, Indiana and lived there until their respective deaths. Frank Pio, our subject, was the fourth child in order of birth born to these French immigrants. He received a common school education and was reared to manhood in Allen County. In 1888, Mr. Pio, in partnership, with Mr. Silas Brattain erected a tile factory on the former's land, and are at present doing a prosperous business. March 12, 1866, Miss Mary, the daughter of Jacob and Mary (Dupray) Barbier, became the wife of Frank Pio, and ten children were born to them, named William J., Joseph J., Norah J, wife of A. F. Hughes; Mary E, Frank A., Jr., Charles E., John W., Henry A., Fred J., and Emma H. Pio. The father, who is independent in his politics, has been trustee of his township (Harrison Twp.) for four terms, and assessor for five terms. He and his family enjoy the esteem of the community in which they reside.



Francis A. Quince, (page 62) a former prominent farmer of Paulding County, was born in Richland County on the 2nd of August, 1849. His parents, Francis and Catherine (Shelly) Quince, were of French lineage and honored residents of the township in which they lived. After obtaining a common school education, Francis Quince began a life for himself. In 1873, on the 13th of January, he was united in matrimony with Miss Agatha Lothammer, a native of France, born in 1852, and the daughter of Theobold and Mary M. (Gamber) Lothammer, of France, the former of whom was born May 5, 1806, and is still well and hearty, and the latter' birth occurring April 10, 1809, her death taking place August 15, 1887. Three children blessed this union, by name: Catherine M., born October 6, 1873; Mary C., born April 11, 1875; Morris O., born June 20, 1877. The father of these children was killed by lightning on the 12th of August, 1880. Since his death the farm work has been overlooked by Mrs. Quince. Mr. Quince, when alive, was identified with the democratic party, and his family are members of the Catholic Church.

# Society Sponsers Lectures



For those who owned their own land, this was an important clue for researcher's to search the grantor and grantee books in Allen County (IN) Recorder's Office for land records. Whether or not, land was owned, another important agriculture schedules that were enumerated between 1850 and 1880.
