News update on the Allen County Public Library: The library will be starting to move to the Lincoln Renaissance Center sometime in January or February. The center is at Clinton and Berry Streets. It is still downtown, and about four blocks from the library. The library will be closed at this time. The genealogy section at the Lincoln Center will be on the whole third floor and al of it will be moved. Check before you head to the library at this time. This move is because the library will be undergoing a complete make over. The fastest way to accomplish this is to stay out of the builder's way!

If you have traced your ancestors back to the Napoleon years, it is obvious he did some major changes in the French calendar between 22 September 1792 until the end of 1805. The French Republic was declared on 22 Sept 1792. Public sentiment was against any old established ways. No longer were the names of Gods, caesars, or numbers used, but descriptive names. The first calendar was 1 Vendmiaire (grape harvest), which is now September. The other months were Brumaire (mist), Frimaire (frost), Nivose (snowy), Pluviouse (rain), Ventose (windy), Germinal (buds), Floreal (flowers), Prairial (meadow), Messidore (harvest gift), Thermidore (heat gift), and Fructidor (fruit gift). The best way to determine any dates at this time is to have a revolutionary calendar which compares the old date to what we use today. The Gregorian calendar was restored 1 January 1806

TWO MEN KILLED One Badly Burned by Explosion of Oil Well at Baldwin, Indiana

A terrible catastrophe occurred in the oil field at Baldwin, IN., a small town on the state line southwest from Payne, yesterday morning, in which two men lost their lives and another was badly burned.

Charles Jaqua, Oren Dickinson and Arthur Rhodes, were drilling in a well on the Davis farm and when the sand was struck there was such a tremendous flow of oil and gas that the drillers could not control it. The well exploded from fire in the boiler and the three men were enveloped with burning oil and gas. Jaqua was instantly killed, Dickinson fatally injured and Rhodes badly burned. The injured men and dead body were taken to Lima, their home.

The well is still on fire and spouting oil every few minutes.

This is where I lost track of him. However, he purchased 40 acres of land from John Haugh Jr in 1851 in Pleasant Twp, near Sheldon (now Yoder). The other person is Barbara Andre. Born in Bitché, Lorraine in 1836 to Matthia Andre and Dorothy Klein. She married Paul Kinder mentioned above in 1852. May 12, 1898 The new St Joseph's hall, at Besançon, will be dedicated by a fair, held during the last week in May, from the 23rd to 28th. All are cordially invited to attend. Fort Wayne persons desiring to attend can take the Wabash train, leaving the south depot, to New Haven, and be conveyed thence by omnibus to Besançon, returning via the Nickel Plate. The railroad companies will announce the times. Nov 14, 1899 ... A number of Fort Wayne people will next Thursday evening attend an entertainment to be given in St Joseph's hall, Besancon, by the French Dramatic club. On Friday night there will follow an oyster supper and on Saturday night stereopticon Dec. 13, 1899 ...- ZULU ITEMS ... Mrs Frances Gamet, or better known as views will be exhibited. Mrs Feane, died last Saturday and was buried Sunday from the St Louis Church, Besançon. She had no relatives. She had made her home at Charles Martin's for the past ten years....Lew Reuille and Mr Vanderberg went to Auburn last Friday on business....Genevieve, twin daughter of Louis Gladio, is dangerously ill....Bernard, son of Lew Reuille had his leg severely cut with a corn knife.
