A BIT OF IRELAND AT BESANÇON

During the summer of 1845, a "blight of unusual character" devastated Ireland's potato crop, the basic staple in the Irish diet. A few days after potatoes were dug from the ground, they began to turn into a slimy, decaying, blackish "mass of rottenness." Expert panels convened to investigate the blight's cause suggested that it was the result of "static electricity" or the smoke that billowed from railroad locomotives or the "mortiferous vapours" rising from underground volcanoes.

The Great Famine or the Great Hunger (Irish: An Gorta Mór or An Drochshaol), known more commonly outside of Ireland as the Irish Potato Famine, is the name given to a famine in Ireland between 1845 and 1849. The immediate after-effects of The Famine continued until 1851. The number of deaths is unrecorded, and various estimates suggest totals between 500,000 and more than one million in the five years from 1846.

Besançon is rich in French history, and as I walk the peaceful rows in the old cemetery, my mind turns to those brave people who risked so much to make a better life for themselves and their families in the new world. I am proud of the heritage I have, and am in awe of the risks they took, the dangers, the absolute dedication. Not all are French names, sprinkled here and there are German, Swiss and Irish.

The family we are featuring in this issue is the Patrick and Nancy Ann (Dwyer) Ryan family, who left their beautiful country of Ireland in 1849, sailed for Canada, where it is thought they lived for three years before they settled in Allen County, Indiana in 1851.

History, actual newspaper reports, and fiction give us a great deal of what these Irish immigrants endured, and the sacrifices they made. One outstanding piece of fiction is by <u>Ann Moore</u> "Gracelin O'Malley", who gives an accurate historical account of the horrors of life in nineteenth century Ireland. As miserable and horrifying as the lives of these people were, the book leaves you in awe of the capacity for the Irish to survive with their humor, pride and hope in tact. ... Editor

Www.castleGarden.org offers free access to a database of 20 million immigrants from 1830-1892. 1892 is the year Ellis Island opened. Castle Garden, today, is known as Castle Clinton National Monument, and is the major landmark within The Battery which is a 23 acre waterfront park at the tip of Manhattan. From 1855 to 1890, the Castle was America's first official immigration center, a pioneering collaboration of New York State and New York City.

New Additions to the library: MONROE TOWNSHIP SCHOOLS, Preserving the history—1843—2005., by Deborah Eidson, Susan Beauchot, and Lois Ternet. This fascinating book takes us back to the beginning of the first school in Monroe Township with pictures and brings us to the present day. This is a great tool for researching for anybody looking for a family member. The history of one-room schools, with teachers listed, curriculum sited, pictures of many classes and news bits from the old Monroeville Breeze newspapers, the year book Echo (first published in 1911, with a class picture) interviews, and yearbooks is a delight. I found pictures of a 1st cousin twice removed, J. J. Peters, that I had searched for many years.

Three books have been added to the archives library they are: <u>The Lothamer History/Genealogy</u>. Three volumes by **Father James Lothamer**. "<u>Dawkins Family</u>", written and compiled by Mariam (Petro) Randolph with added information by Matthew Mapes, courtesy of **Rosemary Dager**. The William Dawkins family can be tracked back to East Kent County, England in 1819, he and his family settled both in Adams and Jefferson Township in 1841. "<u>The Gremaux Family</u>", researched and complied by **E. E. Yoquelet.** The origins of the Gremaux family can be traced back to Courchaton, France and in the church records of Saint Madeleine. The Besançon archives are fortunate to have original Gremaux documents donated by the family.

A dedicated, loving woman, she and her husband **Carlton Giant** are remember as people who were dedicated to preserving the history of Besançon. The original log cabin structure stood at Sugar Ridge Roads (US 30) and Morgan Road, and was the <u>first school</u> in District No 1 prior to 1855. No 1 was torn down in the 1970's.

Ft. Wayne Weekly Sentinel ... 10/15/1896 ... About noon Thursday a Main street car collided with the wagon of a farmer named **Edward Girardot**, of Maples. The accident happened at the intersection of Barr street. The horses, badly frightened, broke away and rand down the nickel Plate tracks a quarter of a mile away before they were stopped. Their legs were badly lacerated. Mr. Girardot was badly shaken up and quite severely injured. The wagon was wrecked.

08/20/1879 ... Items from the Four Corners (Correspondence of the Sentinel) ... The Four Corners is a small place situated in Jefferson township, Allen County. It has a dry goods and grocery store, a saw mill and a physician, with a wagon and carriage shop and a saloon in prospect. We have a blacksmith shop, and a good surrounding country, settled mostly by French people, who are good farmers and good people generally. This is a very healthy part of the county, dry and rolling, and very productive. The corn crop looks well here. The Marsh is to have a large ditch cut through the center of it this fall. Walter Corleman has the whooping cough — that is very singular for a man eighteen years of age. Mr. Gladieux has commenced turning over the soil preparatory to sowing a great amount of fall grain. St. Luke's Church is making arrangements to get a pastor. The hum of the threshing machine is heard in this vicinity, and it is turning out the grain by the hundred bushels. Mr. Frank Gladieux has erected a very fine dwelling. Gust Merilett appears to be in a great amount of trouble about getting his grain threshed, so much so that he says he will have a machine of his own next year. The people say that there will be a fire in the Marsh this fall, providing it keeps dry. There is not much sickness in this part of the county. (DONKEY)

WETS AND DRY'S TO VOTE In Jackson & Madison Townships Soon

Ft Wayne Sentinel, May 5, 1913

In the commissioners' court today May 27 was selected as the date for holding an option election in Jackson township and May 29 for one in Madison township. Petitions asking the board to fix dates and appoint officers were filed last week.

Both townships have saloons now and a big fight is anticipated as the forces are being lined up for the battle. In Jackson township the officers for the anti-saloon people are Julian Pepe, election commissioner, Joseph Baldwin, judge, R. V. Holsaple, clerk. For the wets: William J. Pio is commissioner, August Chevillot, judge, Louis Vanderly, clerk, and Trustee Louis Roy is inspector.

For the drys in Madison township William A. Youse was selected as commissioner; Samuel Houk, judge and David Emenhiser, clerk. Edward Boyle is commissioner for the liquor forces; Jacob Neff, judge; William F. Grotrain, clerk, and Macy Shafer, trustee, is inspector.

HALLOWEEN PRANKS

Ft. Wayne Gazette, Nov 22, 1895

Frank Pranger, Barney Pranger, Lewis Rose, and Nicholas Kline, all of Jefferson township, were arraigned in Justice Ternet's court yesterday, charged with maliciously trespassing on the property of Louis Urbine. The offenses were in the nature of hallowe'en sport overdone and serious depredations were committed. Nicholas Ladig swore to the affidavits. A fine of \$1 and costs was assessed and all the cases were appealed except Kline's and he will probably pay.

SHERIFF' FATHER CLAIMED BY DEATH Francis Gladieux Expires at His home at Age of Seventy-Nine Years.

Nov 18, 1916 Francis Gladieux, father of Sheriff Amiel Gladieux, died Tuesday evening, at his home in Jefferson township at the age of 79 years. Death followed an illness of several months due to complications of diseases. He had been ailing for the past eight years, but had been bedfast only six weeks.

The deceased was born in Alsace, France, October 8, 1837, and came to America with his parents when he was 7 years of age. The family settled in Starke county, Ohio, but in 1853, he moved to Allen county. He settled on a farm in Jefferson township where he resided the remainder of his life. In 1860 he was untied in marriage to Mary Lomont, to which union nine children were born. Three have preceded the father in death. Mr. and Mrs. Gladieux celebrated their golden wedding anniversary six years ago.

For three years Mr. Gladieux served as county commissioner, and at one time was a member of the state legislature, trustee of Jefferson township for twelve years and assessor for four years. Politically he was a democrat. He was also a very active and successful farmer. He owned one of the largest farms in that township and was also an advocate of good roads.

Besides the wife he is survived by six children—Louis, Frank, Amiel and Edward Gladieux and Mrs. Emmett Ternet and Mrs. Louis Roussel; thirty grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren, and a sister, Mrs. Joseph Townsend. Mr. Gladieux was a member of the St. Louis Catholic church at Besançon.

Funeral services Saturday morning at 8:15 o'clock at the residence at 8:45 at St. Louis Catholic church. Interment at the church cemetery.



It was taken from the original document on file at the Smokey Valley Genealogical Society and Library in Salina, KS, and reprinted by the Salina Journal.

French Surnames Meanings & Origins

In France there are around 900,000 surnames - a greater patronymic diversity than in most other countries. The most numerous (268,000 of them) is the Martin dynasty, followed by Bernard, Petit, Thomas, Durandra and. Dupont is in 30th position with 66,000.

Coming from the medieval French word "surmon' translating as "above-or-over name", surnames or descriptive names trace their use back to 11th century France, when it first became necessary to add a second name to distinguish between individuals with the same given name. The custom of using surnames did not become common for several centuries.

Origins of French last names developed from several sources: one of these, is occupational surnames. These are based on the person's job or trade (Pierre Boulanger (baker) - Pierre the baker). Another is descriptive surnames. These often come from nicknames such as Jacques Legrand or "Jacques the big". Geographical surnames is another way to determine a name, most often a place of residence. Yvonne Marseille—or Yvonne from the village of Marseille.

Beginning in 1474, anyone who wished to change his name was requited to get permission from the King. See: *Dictionnaire des changements de noms de 1803 à 1956* Paris: Librarier Française, 1974.


