# President's Message ... Barbara Gorney

In September Gene Yoquelet and Julie Nolan introduced the St. Louis Besancon 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> graders to the archives and cemetery at Besancon. There was a total of 18 children. The two areas had 9 children each and each session was about 45 minutes in order to present an overview of the history of Besancon. The children knew there was something located on the second floor of the previous nun's home and Besancon office, but they didn't realize the size and interests that the Besancon Historical Society has maintained in the archives. After seeing the photo room with over 1200 pictures and the family history room, they were amazed. The consensus was "awesome." Many photos are displayed. They are of individuals, families, and homes. The family histories have been researched on the original families and their cities of origin in Europe. These books have been donated and the contents are shared with other researchers. In the church, the stained glass windows were noted with the names of the parishioners who donated the window. The history of the church was discussed. Would you believe that very few ever had the opportunity to see and hear this information? Thank you, Gene and Julie, for your time and guidance.

Since this is the bicentennial of Oliver Hazard Perry's victory on Lake Erie, the History Center in October invited Neil O'Brien to lecture on this topic. Neil has sailed many years on Lake Erie and has visited key locations of the Lake Erie campaign. His research led him to writing a fictional story. However, the battle on September 10, 1813 was one of the most decisive battles in the history of the United States. Neil gave a detailed account of Perry losing his flag ship and transferring to another well-armed ship of his retinue. Neil even showed by drawing a picture of the number of ships and how the fight was engaged. The commander of the English ships was "dressed to the nines" in his full regalia. Of course, that make him an easy target and he was shot many times. Perry dressed as a regular seaman and was not recognized which irritated the British officer. The Toledo Art Museum had an exhibit on this fight. One item was a large hand drawn map from 1813 of the area and the black swamp which covered also the eastern part of Allen County. However, the black swamp was referred to as the black ash swamp and that it also contained oak and beech trees. The Auglaize River was referred to as River Au Glaze. Does anyone have an ancestor that was part of this victory on Lake Erie?

# **Obituary of Frank Ternet**: (see middle row of photo, & pg. 3, pg. 5 of genealogies)

Frank Ternet, son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Francis Ternet, was born at St. Vincent Parish, Acadamie Station, Allen County, Indiana, on December 25, 1854, where he spent his life until his marriage to Miss Mary Socie, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Socie of Benton township, Ohio, on February 14, 1881, at St. Louis Catholic church of Besancon, Ind. The happy young couple began housekeeping on the old Socie farm and lived there for twenty-five years. There was born to this union nine children-five sons and four daughters, all of whom survive and spent much of their time here caring for their father during his long illness. In 1906 he moved to McGill, O., where he lived two years. While here his beloved wife, aged 48 years, died on January 18, 1907. He then moved to his late home in Benton township, about 2 ½ miles southwest of Payne from which he was called to his heavenly home by his Father on Monday evening, April 13, 1931.

The funeral was held on Thursday morning at ten o'clock at St. John the Baptist church, Payne. The Pastor, Rev. Francis X. Gosser, celebrated the requiem Mass and preached the sermon in which he paid a well deserved tribute of praise to the deceased who had lived in our midst the life of a fine Christian man, being both father and mother to his nine devoted children, who were

deprived of their mother's love and care in early life. The large gathering of people at the home and the church gave evidence of how much he was loved and respected by those who knew him.

In public life he served his township well for years as trustee.

His children are James of LaGrange, Ind., Charles of New Haven, John of Churubusco, Solomon of Monroeville, E(Tim) of New Haven, Miss Cecelia of Raab, O., Mrs. Clara Sullivan of Payne, Mars. L.W. Littlefield of fort Wayne and Miss Ida at home. He leaves two brothers Charles and Emmet, bo9th of Besancon, Ind., and two sisters Mars. Louise Gladieux of Fort Wayne and Mars. Ellen Townsend of Hamilton Lake, Ind.

The pallbearers were his grandson Robert Ternet and his nephews Leslie, Cletus, William and Clarence Ternet and Manford Girardot. Those who came from a distance for the funeral.

Interment was made in the catholic cemetery, southwest of Payne.

We wish to express our sincere thanks to our neighbors and friends who so kindly assisted us during the illness and death of our dear father, Frank Ternet.
