"FOLLOW ME"

INTRODUCTION:

There is a story told about a college professor and a student who were out hiking in the mountains. It was a beautiful autumn day about this time of year. The professor was pointing out many of the trees and animals they had studied in class. Suddenly, as they turned a corner they came upon a large grizzly bear who could be best described as HUNGRY. The professor immediately took charge of the situation. He made a 180 degree turn and ordered the student to in his words "Follow me and stay behind me"

As they were running down the path with the grizzly in hot pursuit, the student, a thinking person even in extraneous circumstances such as these, remembered being taught about grizzly bears by this very same professor.

"But professor," the student exclaimed as they were puffing down the path, "you taught us in class that a man cannot outrun a grizzly bear!!"

"I don't have to outrun the grizzly bear" explained the professor with a frightened look on his face, "all I have to do is outrun you!!!"

The moral of this story of course is that it is O.K. to follow someone but be very careful as to whom you follow!

Fifty years ago this month millions of people followed Adolph Hitler who invaded Poland. The result was that Europe was at war again after only 21 years of peace. Hitler was not the sort of man one should follow.

Two hundred years ago last month (July 14) a Paris mob stormed the Bastille deciding to no longer follow Louis XVI. The French feudal system was abolished and a Declaration of the Rights of Man was instigated.

Thirty years ago last January Pope John XXIII announced that he was calling the first Ecumenical Council since 1870. Most followed his leadership to "update", to open the window and let a little fresh air into the church.

The grandmother of the couple was delighted to see her mother's birth record. It showed Thayma Gremaux born 1917.

I received a letter from Ralph Violette who was our first editor of the Chronicles. He and his wife moved to Florida twelve years ago to be near their daughter. He also thought the climate change would be better than the Indiana winters. He was pleased that BHS still has a presence at the church.

"Why, yes I am" answered the professor somewhat astonished, "How did you know?"

"We know" replied the students, "because your information is 100% accurate and 100% useless to us right now".

Some times when we answer the command of Christ, "Follow me", we experience difficulty. We wonder if we are moving in the right direction. We feel somewhat like Simon Peter who heard Christ say "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God still, and trust in me". It is very difficult to trust someone, to follow someone when you feel like you are drifting away from solid ground.

During this coming year many of you will continue the maturing process of letting go of a childhood view of God and continue to take hold of a more mature adult vision of God. The change is not easy. Like Thomas (John 14:5-6) many of you might ask "—how can we know the way?" And the answer is the same as the one given by Jesus to Thomas.

Ft. Wayne Journal Gazette Sept. 23 1905

Mrs. Emeline Didier, widow of the late Frank Didier, and for half a century a resident of Fort Wayne, died at noon Friday at her residence. 1306 East Wayne street, from a complication of diseases from which she had been a sufferer for many months. Mrs. Didier was born in Columbiana county, O., and was sixty years of age. She was a member of the Rosary society and the St. Vincent De Paul society of the Cathedral, and was a woman of a most lovable personal character and a sincere and devoted Christian.

Surviving her are one son, James E. Duffy, the well known East Columbia street grocer, and the following stepchildren: Frank, Stephen and Joseph Didier, Mrs. William McDonald, of Chicago, and Mrs. Fred Wiechman, of this city. There are also four sisters, Mrs. Robert Gavin and Mrs. Geo. D. Patton, of this city: Mrs. P.E. Carey, of St. Thomas, Canada, and Mrs. F.D. Parsons, of Los Angeles, Cal.

The funeral services will be held from the Cathedral and the time will be announced later. Friends are requested to omit flowers.

Savieo MONROEVILLE, Ind. Nov. 9 Ft. Wayne Journal Gazette Nov. 10, 1911

Mrs. Mary Savieo, 76 years of age, was found dead in her bed this morning at her home on the north side. She had been in failing health for about two years. Her daughter, Mrs. H. C. Davis, went to her home this morning about 8 o'clock, and was shocked to find that she had passed away. Mrs. Savieo was a faithful member of the Saint Rose Catholic church. She is survived by three sons, Louis, Frank and James, and two daughters, Mrs. H.C. Davis and Mrs. D.C. Purman, all of Monroeville.

Roy

Ft. Wayne News Feb. 2, 1911

Mrs. Mary B. Roy, wife of James Roy, 618 Wagner street, died Friday morning following an operation for gall stones, which was performed two months ago. She was sixty-three years, four months and three days of age.

Mrs. Roy was born of French parents at Buffalo, N.Y., in 1817. At the age of ten years she came to Indiana with the family and settled near Monroeville. In 1865 she was married at the Cathedral here to James Roy, shortly after his return from the war. She was a devout Catholic, a member of the Cathedral congregation, the Sacred Heart league and the Ladies' sodality.

Surviving, besides the husband, are six children—Charles Roy, of Monroeville; Joseph S., Saul O. and Miss Sadie Roy, Mrs. M.K. Kanaga and Mrs. Frank Bennett, of Fort Wayne. Three children preceded the mother in death.

Funeral services will be held Monday morning at the Cathedral after which Schone and Onkenbruck will take the remains to Monroeville on a special car.

Joseph Vinot died and buried in the old cemetery of St. Louis Church Besancon, Allen Co. "Vinot" is the only headstone in the cemetery. His wife and children left Allen Co. and migrated to Kansas and finally settled in Denver, Colo.

The two youngest children, Joseph and Justine Frances both died at a young age and buried in the St. Louis cemetery. (No grave markers).

Steven Vinot, 84, Denver Pioneer, to Be Buried Today

The funeral of Steven Vinot, a resident of Denver for fifty-four years who died at St. Joseph's hospital early Wednesday morning will be held at 8:30 o'clock this morning at the McGovern undertaking parlors. Requiem Mass will be sung at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception at 9 o'clock.

Mr. Vinot who was 84 years old was born in France and came to the United States in 1851, locating first at Fort Wayne, Ind., and then at Lawrence, Kan. He came to Denver in 1866 and was associated with the Crystal Ice company, the first ice plant in Denver. Owing to poor health he sold his business and retired in 1880. Six years ago he fractured his hip in an accident, and had been at St. Joseph's hospital since that time.

Mr. Vinot is survived by three daughters, Mrs. George McGlatie, Mrs.Harry Seckler and Mrs. Adolph Schlnner of Denver, and two sons, Albert Vinot of Lost Cabin, Wyo. And Joseph Vinot of Joplin, Mo. One sister, Mrs. Fannie Schueler, lives in Manitou, Colo., and another, Mrs.Frank Girardot, lives at 1135 Fillmore street, Denver. Interment will be made in the family lot at Fairmount cemetery.
