

BISHOP JOSEPH DWENGER SECOND BISHOP OF FORT WAYNE

The parents of Bishop Dwenger, Johann Gerhard Heinrich "Henry" Dwenger and Catherine Wirdt "Maria", immigrated from Aukum, Hanover Germany to the United States along with 2 sons in the early-mid 1830's. In 1837 they purchased 40 acres of land in Mercer County, Ohio, near the present town of St. John. Having built a log cabin out of huge oak trees as their home, in years to come, Bishop Dwenger would say "I was born between four big oak stumps, in a dense forest of Mercer county, Ohio¹." He was born April 7, 1837. The morning after his birth, his father said to a passing neighbor: "Last night God sent us a little bishop! ¹" What a prophecy!?

When Joseph was about 3 yrs. old, his father died (1840). Then his mother moved to Cincinnati with the three sons in hope of support from becoming a member of Holy Trinity parish. The boys attended the parochial school of Holy Trinity. In the summer of 1849 for an unknown reason, the mother left Cincinnati alone with Joseph and returned to the log home in Mercer County, Ohio. But in October of that year, both mother and Joseph fell very ill. The pastor of St. John's was called to attend to them and found the mother dying. Rev. Kinkler promised the mother he would take in and care for the orphan, Joseph, which he did. In the formative years to come, Joseph was educated by the Fathers of the Precious Blood, which Father Kinkler was a member. Joseph became a member of the Congregation of the Most Precious Blood in 1854 and was sent to Mount St. Mary's Seminary at Cincinnati for philosophy and theology. He was ordained a priest by Archbishop Purcell on September 4, 1859. **Continued on pages 2 and 3.**

Father Dwenger was appointed to be rector and professor of the Seminary of the Congregation of the Most Precious Blood of Mercer County, Ohio for the years 1859-1872. During that time, a new building for the seminary was purchased and remodeled. After 1872 he was assigned to parochial work. He served as pastor at Wapakoneta and of St. Mary's in Auglaize County, Ohio, also at the same time of a parish at Glynnwood. He aided in the establishment of Immaculate Conception parish in Celina in Mercer County.

After success in his roles as rector, professor, pastor and financier of poor parishes and church builder, Father Dwenger was assigned to preaching missions from 1867 to 1872. This work took him throughout Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky and other states. During these years, he was befriended by Archbishop Purcell, who had ordained him in 1859, frequently accompanying him on confirmation trips through Mercer and Auglaize counties. Archbishop Purcell chose him as his theologian and secretary at the Council of Baltimore in 1866. Also attending the Second Council of Baltimore representing Very Rev. Andrew Kunkler, Provincial of C. PP. S., who had utmost confidence of Father Dwenger's prudence and business tact, had him preside over nearly all the meetings.

With the death of Bishop Luers, Pope Pius IX appointed Father Dwenger Bishop of Fort Wayne. Archbishop Purcell consecrated him in the Cathedral of Cincinnati on April 14, 1872. As a new Bishop, he began his new labors by investigating the condition of his diocese. Not surprisingly, found it in need of finances. Given his past experiences with poor parishes and starting churches, he managed to wipe out the existing indebtedness in the course of time.

In 1874 Bishop Dwenger was the head of the first American pilgrimage to Rome and Lourdes. As he addressed the clergy of the diocese in a circular: "Conscious of the awful responsibilities of my Holy Office, and my own weakness and imperfections, I leave Fort Wayne the 10th of May next, to make a pilgrimage to Lourdes and to the shrines of the Apostles, hoping thereby to obtain some special graces from God for the salvation of my poor soul; to obtain for myself and my diocese the blessing of our venerable and saintly Pontiff, Pius IX, and to obtain other benefits for my diocese¹." At the Grotto of Lourdes, on entering the magnificent basilica, to the left are many votive offerings which cover the wall. To this Bishop Dwenger left an American flag.

Because Bishop Dwenger was an orphan, he had benevolence towards orphans. In 1875, the asylum near Rensselaer Indiana, for boys and girls had become inadequate, Bishop Dwenger purchased 50 acres of land near Lafayette, where he erected a four story building costing \$30,000. Known as the St. Joseph's Asylum and Manual Labor School for the care of orphan boys. In 1886, in the city of Fort Wayne on a twenty-five acre lot was built an asylum for orphan girls.

His pastoral and missionary work in years past had given rise to his belief of the importance of a parochial school system. He insisted the pastors in every parish provide these schools. In 1879, he established a Diocesan School Board, consisting of 10 priests to supervise the parochial schools of the diocese. They were obliged to visit and examine

the schools in their district at least once a year and report to the Bishop the condition of the schools. Many dioceses of the country adopted this same system.

Throughout the 1880's Bishop Dwenger was a frequent traveler. In 1883, nine years after making the first American pilgrimage to Rome, he again traveled to Rome, also visiting Lourdes on the way. Late in 1884, November and December, Bishop attended the Third Plenary Council of Baltimore amongst thirteen Archbishops and seventy Bishops. The following March of 1885, he was sent as part of a delegation with Bishops John Moore and Richard Gilmour, to Rome to present the decrees of the Third Plenary Council to Pope Leo XIII. While on this Roman trip, he was a guest of the Pontifical North American College, spending seven months. A few years later, 1888 and 1891, the Bishop visited Rome for the last times, in 1888, believing for the sake of his health, and in 1891 in the interest of the American College. Soon after returning from the 1891 trip, he suffered severe heart trouble. During the next three years of his life, until his death in January 1893, his health declined.

Circa 1888-1889, Bishop Dwenger prevailed upon the Fathers C. PP. S. to build a Catholic college. The Community of the Precious Blood purchased land in Rensselaer, Indiana and St. Joseph's College was built. It was opened in September, 1891, though Bishop Dwenger was unable to attend the dedication due to declining health. Editor's note: Father Charles H. Bishop Dwenger led a vigorous life of body and religious soul. His early parochial work, missionary travels throughout the Mid-west, building Churches, orphanages and was a zealous promoter of the parochial school system. He advanced in the American Hierarchy of the Catholic Church, and his many trips abroad, while still attending to his diocese.

After his death, the Pontifical Requiem Mass took place on January 26, 1893. It was celebrated by Archbishop Elder. The funeral oration was delivered by then Bishop Rademacher of Nashville who said in part: From I Macabees, Ch. V, 19-21: "How is the mighty man fallen that saved Israel."---. ."was cast by nature in what we may call a grand heroic mould.". .."In that vigorous body there dwelt a soul, equally vigorous and highly gifted;"---"His powers of endurance and his capacity for had work were simply marvelous." . .."His mind was clear and logical, and he was eminently practical. His memory was prodigious—both faithful and retentive.". .. "As for his love of the Church, it amounted simply to loyalty and chivalry. He was indeed in every sense a most devoted son of the Church, and he was a most true and model son of his country¹."

Bishop Dwenger is entombed in the Crypt of the Cathedral, between Bishop Luers and Bishop Rademacher.

Bishop Dwenger High School of Fort Wayne was established in 1963.

Ft. Wayne Journal-Gazette May 22, 1912 **Florent Voirol**, aged seventy-three years, one of the oldest residents of Jackson township, died Monday at his home after a lingering illness. Mr. Voirol was born in Cantol Borne, Switzerland, October 17, 1837. He came to Allen county in 1851 and resided on the farm on which he died, continuously.

He was a devout member of St. Louis Catholic church, Besancon, and was noted in his community for his good works and his sterling integrity.

Surviving relatives include the widow, to whom he was married in 1874. Mrs. Voirol was Miss Euphrsia Socie and was a native of Starke county, Ohio. To this union were born eleven children, three of whom are dead. The surviving children include sever sons: Emil, Justin, Jules, James, Edward, Joseph and Herman, and one daughter, Miss Anna Voirol. One sister, Mrs. Victor Groumax is living.

Funeral services will be conducted Thrusday morning from the Catholic church at Besancon.



He had kidney, bladder and back injuries. He was struck by a car while crossing the street. He was born in Naples, Italy in 1842 and was a resident in Fort Wayne 69 years. He was a musician and had become an accomplished harpist during his boyhood in Italy. He was a member of St. Peters church and charter member of the Lafayette Legion. His wife Eugenia died four years ago. His children: Mrs. Rose Cochoit, Mrs. Almeda Johnson, Francis H. , Leo V., Emmett R. Fort Wayne, and Angelo F. of Loudenville, Ohio. Six grandchildren, three great-grandchildren.

Buried at St. Patrick's Cemetery, Arcola. His father was Jean Francois Manier 1770-1860. Mother was Anne Bainville 1769-1860 Joseph was married to **Elizabeth Genevieve Laurent** 1803-1874. Children born in France:

- Joseph (Frank) II born 3-19-1833, died 3-24-1916. Married Bridget Smith born 1837. They had 8 children. The eighth child of Joseph and Bridget was August F. Manier. The Fort Wayne Sentinel p9aper said he died 1922 in Dawson City, Alaska following a 4 month illness of pneumonia. He was 60 years old. He left Fort Wayne 21 years before for the gold fields.
- 2. Melanie Born 1838, Married John Schele
- 3. Marie Born 6-12-1841, Died 8-11-1923, age 82, was living on E. Louis St., Fort Wayne. She married Victor Cavalier.

Alfred Rondot believed **Hypolite Manier**, born 7-4-1809 in France could be a brother. He died January 1870. Married to **Margaret Poirson** (also known Grandma Polette), born in France came to Buffalo, New York with her parents in 1833. Married Hypolite in 1833. Hypolite entered the service of Chief Richardville on canal and other public improvements. Then he took up framing in Lake Twp. Allen County. In 1856, they moved to Fort Wayne and established a boarding house on E. Columbia St.
