Most of these committee names are self-explanatory as to the services rendered by each one. I will mention the services of the room mothers:

Two mothers from each room are asked to serve as room representatives. They help to serve as room hostesses for special functions, help to introduce parents to each other and teachers to parents, etc. and they perform other little niceties such as baking cookies for the Christmas parties, Valentine Day and any other special day that warrants a treat for the youngsters.

The officers of the P.T.A. are duly elected and President may serve two years if she chooses to do so, providing, of course that the membership requests her services a second year. On the other hand she has the right to refuse a second term if she wishes. Ordinarily a father patron serves as 2nd Vice-president and presides at the night meetings. Occasionally work schedules or other unavoidable situations make this impossible. At least one teacher holds an elected office each year, usually as recording secretary. The functioning of the various committees operates on a well organized basis and it is through the efforts of all concerned that our meetings and numerous money making projects are so successful. This is tradition with us. We have been given certain standards to meet by the wonderful examples of those who served years ago.

One of these is Mrs. Ora Goff who served as President three years because it was after the completion of her first year the new ruling was put into effect that a president could serve two years. She served one year under the old by-laws and two years under the new. It was during her tenure that many wonderful changes in policy and practice came about. Getting a lot of people interested and setting up committees to carry out certain activities and putting every body to work on a committee started the ball rolling toward the successful program we enjoy today. Her organizational ability and her wonderful disposition and diplomatic handling of school affairs can't be over-rated. She herself would be the last to feel that she deserves any special credit; yet, it is so obvious that a definite transition took place while she was in office. The before and "after" effects are quite distinct. I know she would want me to say that the praise should be given.
